

FAMILY READING GUIDE | MY CHILD IS READING AT



CAN YOUR LEVEL E READER DO THESE THINGS?

- · They can read on their own, they recognize words automatically and don't need to point to each word.
- · They can use their finger to help break apart unknown words. They can cover up the part of the word they know and look at the part that is left.
- They can read words with long vowels (silent e: take, bike; two vowels: team, boat).
- · They can make reading sound smooth, like talking.

HOW CAN I HELP MY CHILD MOVE TO THE NEXT READING LEVEL?

- · Build in 20 minutes (or more) of reading time per day. This can be you reading to them, taking turns or your child reading on their own.
- When reading to a child:
- · Teach the word "genre," or type of book. Ask if the book is fiction (a made up story) or non-fiction (a book about facts).
- · Make connections by reading the title and looking at the cover, ask your child if this book reminds them of another book they've read.
- · Explain problem and solution. After reading a fiction book, ask your child what the *problem* is or what went wrong in the story. How was this problem solved, or fixed, at the end of the book?
- · Point out a new or challenging word, give them a kid-friendly definition (Solar means sun).

WHEN MY CHILD READS TO ME:

- · Have your child read a level E book to you every day, or a level F book with your help.
- Point out "text features," or helpful parts of of non-fiction books, like the table of contents. captions under pictures, bold words, the index and glossary.
- · Ask them a question about the story. Have them "prove" the answer by looking back in the story (What is the largest planet? Show me the page where you read the answer.)
- · After reading, ask them to retell you the beginning, middle and end of the story.

SHOW THEM HOW TO READ PUNCTUATION MARKS:

- period (.) means stop and our voice drops exclamation point (!) shows strong feeing so our voice gets loud
 - question mark (?) means asking so our voice goes up comma (,) means pause, take a breath
 - quotation marks ("") means someone is talking, read like the character's voice

- · Three to eight lines of print per page.
- · Some three syllable words.
- · More genres of reading like informational, fairy tales, realistic fiction, poems.
- · Stories are becoming more complex and students must do more problem solving to figure out new words.
